

at this time. The limited funding available for traffic surveys must be directed towards locations where collision history, or other identified road safety concerns, demonstrate a greater need for investigation and potential intervention.

Whilst I appreciate that residents may perceive speeding to be an issue, the current collision evidence does not support the allocation of resources to undertake further speed surveys within the villages at present.

However, although the Council is responsible for setting speed limits, the enforcement of those limits is a matter for South Wales Police, and the Council has no powers to enforce speeding offences. Therefore, where residents continue to witness vehicles travelling at excessive speeds, we recommend that concerns are reported directly to South Wales Police via their non-emergency number 101 or online at:

GoSafe assesses requests against Welsh Government criteria, including collision history and evidence of excessive vehicle speeds.

Should circumstances change in the future, such as the emergence of a collision pattern or other demonstrable road safety concerns, the locations can be reviewed again as part of the Council's ongoing assessment process.
